Leslie A. Meek

Leslie Meek was born in Brooklyn, New York and attended New York and Chicago Public Schools.

In 1987, Ms. Meek graduated from Fisk University where she earned a B.A. in Political Science. Three years later she earned her Juris Doctorate from Case Western Reserve University School of Law. While attending law school, Ms. Meek was personally recruited by former U.S. Attorney General Janet Reno and became an Assistant State's Attorney in Miami-Dade County, Florida. Ms. Meek also served as Assistant City Attorney for the City of Miami and as Assistant General Counsel for the Comptroller of the State of Florida.

In July 1995, she began work with the United Teachers of Dade, the fourth largest teacher's local in the country. In May 2000, Ms. Meek was appointed General Counsel of the United Teachers of Dade, making her the first African-American to ascend to the position. Ms. Meek served as Administrative Law Judge with the District of Columbia Department of Employment Services adjudicating workers' compensation cases. Currently, Ms. Meek serves as an Administrative Law Judge for the District of Columbia's Office of Administrative Hearings.

Ms. Meek is the former Chair of the Congressional Black Caucus Spouses, an arm of the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation. In this role, Ms. Meek lead the group's fundraising efforts, which support the CBC Spouses Education Scholarship Program, a fund that provides financial assistance to needy college and university students across the country.

Leslie Meek is a life member of the NAACP and a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. She has served as a Board Member of the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation, a Board of Trustee Member of Fisk University, and a Board Member of the Lab School of Washington. Ms. Meek has served as Vice-Chair of the District of Columbia Association of Administrative Law Judges, served as judge for the Georgetown Street Law Mock Trial Competition, the Georgetown Charles Hamilton Houston Mock Trial Competition and the George Washington University School of Law Moot Court Competition.
